Dear Safety Awards Program Participant,

Happy New Year! We're gearing up to kick off our 2017 safety awards season, and we hope that your company will be able to celebrate its safety accomplishments with the N.C. Department of Labor again this year. The safety awards program is our way of rewarding you for the success of your safety and health program.

Last year we presented a total of 3,375 safety awards, which was a milestone for us. We've never had that many sites qualify for an award in the 71 years of the safety awards program. Of those, 2,865 were gold and 510 were silver. In addition to safety awards, we also presented 113 million-hour awards.

The gold award criteria are based on achieving a rate of days away from work, job transfer or restriction (DART) that is at least 50 percent below the industry rate. The silver award criteria include lost workday cases but not restricted work activity, and the applicant must attain a rate for cases with days away from work (CDAW) that is at least 50 percent below the industry rate. The rate chart that is included in this package contains numbers supplied from the Bureau of Labor Statistics from 2015. They are calculated to 50 percent of the incidence rate for each NAICS code. A firm must not have had a fatality at the site or location applying for an award during 2016 to qualify for either award.

Please take a few minutes to complete the enclosed application by entering the requested data for calendar year 2016. Applications are due by **February 17, 2017**. Even if you do not qualify for an award, submit the application to remain on the mailing list. The safety award applications also can be accessed and completed on the NCDOL website at **www.nclabor.com**.

In addition to the gold and silver safety awards, we would like to remind you about the Million-Hour Safety Awards. Million-hour safety awards are given to firms that accumulate 1 million employee hours with no case of injury or illness involving days away from work. Million-hour awards are presented during the local annual safety awards ceremony.

If your company qualifies for an award, you and your employees will be invited to attend a safety awards banquet in your area, and your local media will be notified of qualifying businesses. The following chart shows 2015 incidence rates of nonfatal occupational injuries and illness by industry. The DART rate includes days away from work, job transfer or restriction. The CDAW rate includes cases involving days away from work but does not include restricted activity.

In order to qualify for a safety award, your incidence rate must be equal to or less than the incidence rate listed for your NAICS code.

**Note**: The rates listed below are 50 percent of the incidence rate for each NAICS code.
